## **Aim & Scope**

JLS is an international scholarly journal that provides a forum devoted to current and state of the art studies in Language and Communication. It is a fully refereed journal, focusing both on conceptual and theoretical approaches to Language and Communication studies. Submissions that deal with case studies and essays demonstrating new knowledge and advanced methods providing heightened scholarly understanding of traditional topics in English and French linguistics or literary studies, pragmatics, discourse studies and (new) media communications are particularly welcome. The journal also encourages descriptive and highly objective reviews.

The journal aims to maintain rapid editorial procedures and a rigorous peer review system. Submitted articles are reviewed within approximately three months of submission and the accepted articles are published shortly afterwards. JLS is published twice a year (February & August), both electronically as well as in printed form by Covenant University Press, Canaanland, Ota, Nigeria.

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## **Guide for Authors**

### **(1) *Manuscript Preparation***

*The text should be double-spaced throughout and with a minimum of 3cm for left and right hand margins and 5cm at head and foot. Text should be standard 12 point. Authors are advised to use the 'spell-check' and 'grammar-check' functions of the word processor. A separate title page should contain author information (see below).*

(i) **Title Page**

- (a) **Title.** *The title of the manuscript should be concise and informative. Titles are often used in information-retrieval systems. Avoid abbreviations and formulae where possible.*
- (b) **Author names and affiliations.** *State first and family names clearly and full. No abbreviations please. Present the authors' affiliation addresses (where the actual work was done) below the names. Indicate all affiliations with a lower-case superscript letter immediately after the author's name and in front of the appropriate address. Provide the full postal address of each affiliation, including the country name and, the e-mail address of each author.*
- (c) **Corresponding author.** *In the case of more than one author, clearly indicate who will handle correspondence at all stages of refereeing and publication. Please provide the email address, the complete postal address.*
- (d) **Bio-data.** *A short bio-data of about 100 words of the author(s) should be included on the title page.*

(ii) **Abstract**

*A concise abstract of about 150 words is required. The abstract should state briefly the purpose of the paper, major results and conclusions. It must be written in such a way that it can stand alone.*

(iii) **Keywords**

*Provide a maximum of 7 keywords immediately after the abstract.*

(2) **Titles**

*Titles and subheadings should be brief and clear. Sections/subheadings should be numbered.*

(3) **Language of the JLS**

*JLS publishes papers in **English and French** only. Quotations of text fragments from other languages should be accompanied with an English translation (if the paper is in English). Also, there should be French translations of English quotations in a paper written in French.*

(4) **Length of manuscript**

*A manuscript should not exceed 8,000 words including the abstract, endnotes and references.*

(5) **Citation in text**

*References made in the text should be presented in the reference list (and vice versa). Unpublished results and personal communications are not recommended in the reference list, but may be mentioned in the text. Citation of a reference as 'in press' implies that the item has been accepted for publication. Citations in the text should follow the following order: 'Fairclough (2001), or (Fairclough, 2001).'*

(6) **Quotations**

*Quotations are to be cited in single inverted commas with indications, where appropriate, of any omission, added emphasis, or other alteration to the original. Quotations more than 4 lines should be indented and typed in single line spacing without quotation marks.*

(7) **Guidelines for submitting figures and other graphics**

*Illustrations, figures, graphics and tables should appear in the body of the manuscript where the author wants them. Tables and figures should have short descriptive titles. The journal would prefer tables and figures rather than artworks.*

(8) **Referencing Style**

*The JLS adopts the Harvard referencing style. For example:*

*(iii) Chapter in an edited book*

Foucault, M. (1991a) 'Politics and the Study of Discourse', in G. Burchell, C. Gordon and P.H. Miller (eds). *The Foucault Effect: Studies in Governmentality*, pp. 53–72. Hemel Hempstead: Harvester Wheatsheaf.

**(9) Endnotes**

*Endnotes are optional and should be used sparingly.*

**(10) Acknowledgements and funding information**

*Acknowledgements and funding information should come immediately after the main text before the endnotes (where applicable).*
